Prominently seated in the first row with a broad smile is our own Dave Steidley. The instructor is Wayne Youngblood and the course is "Stamp Technology". I asked Dave for a few comments on the experience and he supplied the following:

SNOWFLAKES

Snowflakes are clusters of solid plate-like or star-shaped crystals or crystal fragments of an almost endless variety but with a pronounced symmetry. They are complicated in nature and beautiful in form, often with thin lamina or translucent prisms, but always based on a hexagonal system having 60° or 120° angles. The individual crystals are transparent ice but snow appears white because of the numerous reflecting surfaces.

Although the hexagonal symmetry of snow crystals had been known by the Chinese before the birth of Christ, Olaus Magnus (1490–1557), archbishop of Uppsala in Swe- Britain 1989/ Scott 1285 den, depicted their symmetrical structure in a book published

in Rome in 1555. With the development of the microscope, the structure of ice crystals could more easily be seen and studied and in 1665, Robert Hooke (1635–1703) an English physicist, published his famous book Micrographia containing microscopic illustrations of snowflakes.

Actual photomicrographic images of snowflakes on postage stamps are uncommon, but in 1989 Great Britain issued a set of four stamps to commemorate the 150th

anniversary of the Royal Microscopical Society. One of these stamps depicts a photomicrographic image of a snowflake, the symbol of the Royal Microscopical Society. The 1971 Christmas stamps from Canada show some of the beautiful and intricate structures that these little pieces of ice can attain. However, much more common on postage stamps are representations of snowflakes as seen on the 1974 Christmas stamp from Finland.
