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Artists of the Washington Bicentennial Issue: Part 1

In 1932, to mark the 200th anniversary of the birth of George Washington, the United States Post Office Department issued a series of 11 stamps—The Washington Bicentennial Issue. In this article we will look at the paintings by **Charles W. Peale** that were used for five of those eleven stamps.

Charles Willson Peale, born in Chestertown, Maryland, on April 16, 1741, was a man of many interests at one time being a saddlemaker, soldier, legislator, dentist and naturalist. His fame, however rests on his skill as a portrait artist and he painted many of the major figures of his time. He studied under John Singleton Copley in Boston and Benjamin West in London learning wax modelling, plaster casting, mezzotint and miniature painting. After establishing himself in Philadelphia, he helped organize the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and participated in a number of its exhibitions. He died in 1827.

In 1772 he painted his first portrait of George Washington and subsequently painted him repeatedly during the Revolutionary War. Several of his portraits of Washington have been used as the basis for stamp designs by postal agencies around the world including the United States Postal Office. Besides Washington, his portraits of Benjamin Franklin, John Adams, John Paul Jones, Thomas Jefferson and others have been reproduced on postage stamps.



½¢ George Washington

J. de Mare produced an engraving from a miniature that Peale made just before the Battle of Germantown in 1777 when Washington was 45 years old. The miniature is at the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

1½¢ George Washington

Painted by Peale in 1772, when Washington was 40, it shows him in his French & Indian War uniform as a colonel in the Virginia militia. It is the earliest life portrait of Washington and is now at the Lee Memorial Chapel, Washington & Lee University.





3¢ George Washington

Painted by Peale in 1777 at Valley Forge during the Continental Army's encampment. Washington's uniform is that of lieutenant general. When the stamp was issued the painting was at the State Normal School in West Chester, Pennsylvania.

4¢ George Washington

Painted by Peale in 1787. Washington was a delegate to the constitutional convention being held in Philadelphia.





5¢ George Washington

Painted by Peale in 1795 when Washington was 63 years old and in his second term as President. This is the last of Peale's fourteen known portraits of Washington and is now in the New York Historical Society.
