Answers - January/February Philatelic Quiz

Q1. Six United States Presidents initially lost a bid for the White House before succeeding on a later try. Can you name them?

Thomas Jefferson lost to John Adams and served as his vice-president in the 1796 election. In the 1800 election Jefferson won against John Adams.

John Quincy Adams lost to James Monroe in the 1820 election. The 1824 election was decided by the House of Representatives in Adam's favor when Andrew Jackson won a plurality of the popular vote, but did not receive a majority of the electoral vote.

Andrew Jackson - In the 1828 election, Jackson won and John Quincy Adams was defeated.

William Henry Harrison lost to Martin Van Buren in 1836, but beat Van Buren in the 1840 election.

Grover Cleveland lost to Benjamin Harrison in 1888, but won the presidency against Harrison in 1892.

Richard M. Nixon lost to John F. Kennedy in 1960 and defeated Hubert H. Humphrey in 1968.

Q2. A number of United States stamps have nicknames. To what stamps do the nickname "Battleships" apply?

Ans. The 1898 revenue stamps depicting U.S.S. Maine.

The U.S.S. *Maine* was a 2nd class battleship built at the New York Navy Yard in 1895. In January 1898 she was sent to Havana, Cuba to protect United States interests and on February 15th sank following a massive explo-

sion that killed most of her crew. The sinking was a precipitating cause of the Spanish-American War that began in April 1898 and lasted until August of that year. The image on the stamp is based on a watercolor painting by Frederick Nelson Atwood.

Q3. At some point in its history, this Balkan kingdom had ties to Austria, Italy, Germany, Serbia and Yugoslavia.

Ans. Montenegro

Invaded by the Austro-Hungarian army in 1915-1916 it became a vassal state under the Austrian Habsburg monarchy. In 1918 it became a province of the new kingdom of Serbs, Croats and Slovenes which was renamed Yugoslavia





in 1929. With the disintegration of Yugoslavia in 1991, Montenegro remained in an alliance with Serbia. During World War II Italian troops occupied parts of the country in April 1941 while the Germans occupied areas of the country in late 1943.

Q4. Where and when was the first airmail flight using an airplane?

Ans. India on February 18, 1911

Henri Pequet, a French pilot, flew from Allahabad, India to Naini, a distance of about six miles carrying several thousand letters and cards for which a fee was charged to post an item.



Q5. Ulysses S. Grant died within days of finishing dictation of a two-volume memoir of his life. Who was the friend who published his work earning over \$400,000 for the family of the late president?

Ans. Mark Twain

Ulysses S. Grant became a partner and invested all of his property in a banking house, Grant & Ward, in which one of his sons was involved. In 1884 the firm went bankrupt leaving Grant penniless. He decided to write his autobiography finishing the two-volume work shortly before his death on July 23, 1885 from throat cancer. Between 1885-1886 Mark Twain published the autobiography *Personal Memoirs of Ulysses S. Grant* raising a considerable amount of money for Grant's family.

Lot #1 A "Covered Wagon" cigar box filled with many remainders – We note over 50 very fine lightly cancelled US blocks of four, over \$3.00 in face value (all MNH) of older stamps, some covers and more!

Lot #2 Gorgeous Colorano Maximum Cards – Most FDC collectors know Colorano as the producer of "silk" cachets, which began in 1971. But before silks, Colorano produced maximum card FDCs. This is a lot of 24 in as brand new condition from the 70's – look at "The Jazz Singer"! estimated retail value is \$25++ **Reserve** is \$3.00

Lot #3 40 MNH Plate Blocks from various time periods very high catalog value – face is \$23.44 Reserve is \$19.00

Lot #4 US MNH Plate Block #1279 2011 Scott Catalog Value is \$4.00 – (We note that the 1991 Scott value was \$12..00) for this "Prominent American"! Reserve is \$2.00

Lot #5 A spiral glassine book of 20+ cacheted first day covers –we note some better Olympics cachets and some other nice cachets; plus 30 blanks FDCs; plus two gold metal stamped FDCs!! . Estimated retail is about \$25

Our Reserve is the dealer's buy price of \$6.00 for this \$4.30 of 1976 face, which was supposed to be worth \$50. by now!

Lot #8 The USPS Wildflower pane of 50 29c stamps + their hard cover book – estimated retail value- \$23.00.

Reserve is \$17.00

Lot #13 US Scott #512 – a very nice block of four, but two of the stamps are LH and two are NH, The 2011 Scott value for the four single stamps is \$52. LH+ NH Estimated retail is \$16-\$25.
